SUBJECT: GREEN-WASTE DIVERSION PROGRAMS

Members of the Board:

On October 7, 1997, your Board received a report on the County's Greenwaste Demonstration Project and directed Public Works to return in October 1998 with a report on the effects of implementation of recommended greenwaste diversion programs. We are pleased to report that the greenwaste diversion programs implemented over the last year have resulted in a significant increase in the diversion of woodwaste and yardwaste materials from the County's Buena Vista Landfill. Attached you will find data and graphical representations illustrating the increase in collection of greenwaste from the County's residential and commercial wastestreams.

Prior to implementing the new curbside yardwaste collection program through Waste Management, the existing self-haul greenwaste diversion program at the County's Buena Vista Landfill and Ben Lomond Transfer Station was diverting an average of 13,000 tons of material annually. Implementation of expanded public education efforts and the curbside yardwaste collection program has increased the annual diversion to an average of 2 1,000 tons per month.

Several new source reduction programs have also been implemented to further improve greenwaste diversion countywide including:

- Expanding the home cornposting program including increased public education, creation of the "Rotline" for provision of information and technical assistance to home cornposters, expansion of the Master Cornposter training program, and Waste Management sales of low cost home cornposters and worm cornposters to county residents;
- Funding for development of a worm cornposting facility with the Skills Center through the County's Waste Reduction Grant. This facility utilizes vegetable wastes from markets to support the worm farm which in turn supplies worms for worm cornposters distributed by Waste Management;

- Waste Reduction Grant funding for development of a residential home cornposting facility for a large farm-worker housing facility; and
- Waste Reduction Grant funding for a compost demonstration facility at Cabrillo College to be utilized for training small businesses and residential composters.

Initial public feedback and review of the last eleven months of diversion data indicate an increasing trend in diversion of greenwaste from the Buena Vista Landfill. We expect the amount of greenwaste diversion to continue to increase over the next several years as more residents and businesses become aware and take advantage of the many low cost diversion programs available in our County.

It is therefore recommended that your Board accept and file this report on the greenwaste diversion programs in the County.






