SUBJECT: CHANGES IN AMBULANCE RESPONSE PERFORMANCE STANDARDS

Dear Board Members:

At the time your Board approved the December,1997 AMR/County ambulance agreement, board members expressed interest in improving the performance requirements in certain areas, especially areas immediately contiguous to Watsonville and Santa Cruz.

After careful study and consultation with AMR, the County's Ambulance Contract Compliance Commission, staff of the Consolidated Emergency Communications Center staff, and county counsel, agreement has been reached on the following changes in performance standards:

- 1. A 30-minute performance zone will replace some of the current 60 minute zones;
- 2. A 12-minute performance zone will be added around the City of Watsonville replacing the current 15 minute zone:
- 3. A 15-minute performance zone will be added to the area north of the City of Santa Cruz; and
- 4. The performance requirements of a few additional grids will be adjusted to provide for more consistent and contiguous county-wide standards.

These changes are shown on a large map which is on file with the Clerk of the Board. A smaller version of this map is appended as Attachment A.

AMR is now required by contract to meet performance standards in 90% of their responses in the various time zones, except for one 60-minutes zone in which the standard is 95%. These requirements will continue unchanged even with these adjustments. AMR has agreed that the enhanced response requirements specified in this letter and depicted on the attached map, will be adopted for 1999 as the system's "preferred" standard while the current contract

performance standards will continue as the "minimum" standard. In any month in which AMR fails to meet the preferred standard HSA will, upon request, prepare performance reports using the minimum standards. AMR will not be held to a standard higher than the minimum standard unless a formal contract change is agreed upon.

With this mutually agreed upon change, an enhanced service level can begin immediately. When the opportunity arise for making a formal contract change, compliance standards can than be adjusted. In the interim a comfort level with these more stringent standards can have been reached.

It is, therefore, RECOMMENDED that your Board:

1. Accept and file this report on ambulance response performance standards.
