

Window displays, parent services

WATSONVILLE — There's no telling what can happen when creative minds get together.

This time, it happened on Main Street, in the dusty, old display window of the earthquake damaged Kalich Building, A group of women from a handful of parent services groups got together and turned a downtown eyesore into a colorful, bilingual resource display.

Maria Castro o f Migrant Head Start, Gail Knapp of the YWCA and Rosa Clari*In and Maria Gren dos of the Asociacio*In de Prove dores de Cuidado de Ninos (Childcare Providers Association). interspersed a whimsical collection of children's art with listings of health and safety, counseling. housing, legal, recreation, employment and other resource groups in the South County area. "La Fruta do Nuestro Labor/The Fruit of our Labor" rends a berry-bedecked display. Main Street Watsonville. which authorized the display, required a strawberry theme to promole an upcoming Strawberry Dessert Festival.

The display is a gold mine of information in one of downtown's

most heavily traveled foot-traffic areas.

And the project didn't stop there. Their planning sessions together gave birth to a new coalition that is poised to tackle one of the biggest challenges that faces the county iii the months and years ahead: child care.

With the advent of welfare reform, hundreds more children will need subsidized daycare as their parents move into entry-level jobs. The new South County Child Care Network wants to ensure that the quality of care doesn't suffer as untrained individuals step in to fill the gap.

" I I the next few months, child care i s completely going change," said Castro. Government agencies are looking at the possibility of using welfare parents as daycare providers, solving two problems at once.

"It's a temptation," Castro said. "It's fast, it's easy and it's logical. It finds employment for these peonle - but at what cost?"

Indiscriminately urging welfare parents to become daycare providers could have serious implications, Castro said, noting that minimal mandatory health and safety training requirements were not enough to ensure quality care.

Only those with a predisposition for that type of work should be encouraged to care for children, she said, and child care providers, regardless of education level, should have access to enrichment courses. that help them provide a stimulating environment for their young

ones.
