SUBJECT: WASTE REDUCTION GRANT PROGRAM PROPOSAL

Members of the Board:

In accordance with the Waste Reduction Grant Program Procedures approved by your Board on June 3, 1997, the grant evaluation team convened on April 7, 2000, and rated a grant application with a qualifying score.

The application from O'Neill Sea Odyssey proposes to add a waste reduction component to their existing hands-on, ocean-based environmental educational program that reaches 3,000 to 4,500 4th through 8th grade students annually from schools in Santa Cruz County and throughout the Central Coast region. The educational experience in conservation, ecology, navigation, and marine science takes place at a shore-side laboratory as well as on board a 65-foot catamaran sailing in the Monterey Bay.

Specific goals of the Divert on Land, Learn at Sea project, which would be funded by the grant, are to add waste reduction and diversion education to the course curriculum and to make waste reduction and diversion the focus of community service projects.

O'Neill Sea Odyssey will develop a curriculum on waste reduction and diversion that it will incorporate into the ecology unit, which is one-third of its three-hour course. The new curriculum, to teach youth the value that waste stream diversion has in the protection of the environment, will be developed in consultation with the County of Santa Cruz Office of Education to be consistent with the Public Schools Resource Conservation Program curriculum. A curriculum developed with grant funding will be incorporated into the ongoing Sea Odyssey program.

Completion of community service projects is required of all students participating in the Sea Odyssey program. Community service projects focusing on waste reduction or diversion will include such activities as recycling, recycling awareness, school composting, and beach cleanups. Grant funding will be used to develop a database of projects' and tools needed for their execution to be used for many years to come.

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O'Neill Sea Odyssey has been offering its educational program since 1996. The Waste Reduction Grant request, for one-time program development, is a small portion of Sea Odyssey's annual budget of \$335,000, which is secured from public and private sources and the organization's business activities.

According to procedures, Public Works has negotiated a contract with the successful applicant. The contract is attached for your Board's approval. Cost for the proposed project is \$24,684, and sufficient funds are available in the CSA 9C Solid Waste Budget for this purpose,

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Supervisors take the following action:

- 1. Approve an independent contractor agreement with O'Neill Sea Odyssey to conduct the Divert on Land, Learn at Sea project for a not-to-exceed amount of \$24,684.
- 2. Authorize the Director of Public Works to sign the contract on behalf of the County of Santa Cruz.

- 1. <u>DUTIES.</u> CONTRACTOR agrees to exercise special skill to accomplish the following result: Conduct "Divert on Land, Learn at Sea" project, as described in Scope of Work.
- 2. <u>COMPENSATION.</u> In consideration for CONTRACTOR accomplishing said result, COUNTY agrees to pay CONTRACTOR as follows: Not to exceed \$24,684.00 ina manner described in Scope of Work.
- 3. <u>TERM.</u> The term of this contract shall be: from date of execution until completion.
- 4. <u>EARLY TERMINATION</u>. Either party hereto may terminate this contract at any time by giving 30 days written notice to the other party.
- 5. <u>INDEMNIFICATION FOR DAMAGES. TAXES AND CONTRIBUTIONS.</u> CONTRACTOR shall exonerate, indemnify, defend, and hold harmless COUNTY (which for the purpose of paragraphs 5 and 6 shall include, without limitation, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers) from and against:
- A. Any and all claims, demands, losses, damages, defense costs, or liability of any kind or nature which COUNTY may sustain or incur or which may be imposed upon it for injury to or death of persons, or damage to property as a result of, arising out of, or in any manner connected with the CONTRACTORS performance under the terms of this Agreement, excepting any liability arising out of the sole negligence of the COUNTY. Such indemnification includes any damage to the person(s), or property(ies) of CONTRACTOR and third persons.
- B. Any and all Federal, State and Local taxes, charges, fees, or contributions required to be paid with respect to CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTORS officers, employees and agents engaged in the performance of this Agreement (including, without limitation, unemployment insurance, social security and payroll tax withholding).
- 6. <u>INSURANCE</u>. CONTRACTOR, at its sole cost and expense, for the **full** term of this Agreement (and any extensions thereof), shall obtain and maintain at a minimum compliance with all of the following insurance coverage(s) and requirements. Such insurance coverage shall be primary coverage as respects COUNTY and any insurance or self-insurance maintained by County shall be excess of CONTRACTORS insurance coverage and shall not contribute to it.

If CONTRACTOR utilizes one or more subcontractors in the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall obtain and maintain Independent Contractor's Insurance as to

each subcontractor or otherwise provide evidence of insurance coverage for each subcontractor equivalent to that required of CONTRACTOR in this Agreement, unless CONTRACTOR and COUNTY both initial here/							
A. Types of Insurance and Minimum Limits							
(1) Worker's Compensation in the minimum statutorily required coverage amounts. This insurance coverage shall not be required if the CONTRACTOR has no employees and certifies to this fact by initialing here							
(2) Automobile Liability Insurance for each of CONTRACTOR's vehicles used in the performance of this Agreement, including owned, non-owned (e.g. owned by CONTRACTOR's employees), leased or hired vehicles, in the minimum amount of \$500,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. This insurance coverage shall not be required if vehicle use by CONTRACTOR is not a material part of performance of this Agreement and CONTRACTOR and COUNTY both certify to this fact by initialing here/							
(3) Comprehensive or Commercial General Liability Insurance coverage in the minimum amount of \$1 ,000,000 combined single limit, including coverage for: (a) bodily injury, (b) personal injury, (c) broad-form property damage, (d) contractual liability, and (e) cross-liability.							
(4) Professional Liability Insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000.00 combined single limit, if, and only if, this Subparagraph is initialed by							

B. Other Insurance Provisions

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CONTRACTOR and COUNTY -

- (1) If any insurance coverage required in this Agreement is provided on a "Claims Made" rather than "Occurrence" form, CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain the required coverage for a period of three (3) years **after** the expiration of this Agreement (hereinafter "post agreement coverage") and any extensions thereof CONTRACTOR may maintain the required post agreement coverage by renewal or purchase of prior acts or tail coverage. This provision is contingent upon post agreement coverage being both available and reasonably affordable in relation to the coverage provided during the term of this Agreement. For purposes of interpreting this requirement, a cost not exceeding 100% of the last annual policy premium during the term of this Agreement in order to purchase prior acts or tail coverage for post agreement coverage shall be deemed to be reasonable.
- (2) All required Automobile and Comprehensive or Commercial General Liability Insurance shall be endorsed to contain the following clause:

"The County of Santa Cruz, its officials, employees, agents and volunteers are added as an additional insured as respects the operations and activities of, or on behalf of, the named insured performed under Agreement with the County of Santa Cruz."

(3) All required insurance policies shall be endorsed to contain the

following clause:

(4) CONTRACTOR agrees to provide its insurance broker(s) with a full copy of these insurance provisions and provide COUNTY on or before the effective date of this Agreement with Certificates of Insurance for all required coverages. All Certificates of Insurance shall be delivered or sent to:

- 7. <u>EOUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.</u> During and in relation to the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees as follows:
- A. The CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer related), marital status, pregnancy, sex, sexual orientation, age (over 18), veteran status or any other non-merit factor unrelated to job duties. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: recruitment; advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training (including apprenticeship), employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer. The CONTRACTOR agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notice setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.
- B. If this Agreement provides compensation in excess of \$50,000 to CONTRACTOR and if CONTRACTOR employs fifteen (15) or more employees, the following requirements shall apply:
- (1) The CONTRACTOR shall, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the CONTRACTOR, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer related), marital status, pregnancy, sex, sexual orientation, age (over 18), veteran status, or any other non-merit factor unrelated to job duties. In addition, the CONTRACTOR shall make a good faith effort to consider Minority/Women/Disabled Owned Business Enterprises in CONTRACTOR's solicitation of goods and services. Definitions for Minority/Women/Disabled Business Enterprises are available from the COUNTY General Services Purchasing Division.
- (2) The CONTRACTOR shall furnish COUNTY **Affirmative** Action Office information and reports in the prescribed reporting format (PER 4012) **identifying** the sex, race, physical or mental disability and job classification of its employees and the names,

dates and methods of advertisement and direct solicitation efforts made to subcontract with Minority/Women/Disabled Business Enterprises.

- (3) In the event of the CONTRACTORS non-compliance with the non-discrimination clauses of this Agreement or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders said CONTRACTOR may be declared ineligible for further agreements with the COUNTY.
- (4) The CONTRACTOR shall cause the foregoing provisions of this Subparagraph 7B. to be inserted in all subcontracts for any work covered under this Agreement by a subcontractor compensated more than \$50,000 and employing more than fifteen (15) employees, provided that the foregoing provisions shall not apply to contracts or subcontracts for standard commercial supplies or raw materials.
- 8. <u>INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS</u>. CONTRACTOR and COUNTY have reviewed and considered the principal test and secondary factors below and agree that CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor and not an employee of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR is responsible for all insurance (workers, compensation, unemployment, etc.) and all payroll related taxes. CONTRACTOR is not entitled to any employee benefits. COUNTY agrees that CONTRACTOR shall have the right to control the manner and means of accomplishing the result contracted for herein.

<u>PRINCIPAL TEST:</u> The CONTRACTOR rather than COUNTY has the right to control the manner and means of accomplishing the result contracted for.

SECONDARY FACTORS: (a) The extent of control which, by agreement, COUNTY may exercise over the details of the work is slight rather than substantial; (b) CONTRACTOR is engaged in a distinct occupation or business; (c) In the locality, the work to be done by CONTRACTOR is usually done by a specialist without supervision, rather than under the direction of an employer; (d) the skill required in the particular occupation is substantial rather than slight; (e) The CONTRACTOR rather than the COUNTY supplies the instrumentalities, tools and work place; (f) The length of time for which CONTRACTOR is engaged is of limited duration rather than indefinite; (g) The method of payment of CONTRACTOR is by the job rather than by the time; (h) The work is part of a special or permissive activity, program, or project, rather than part of the regular business of COUNTY; (i) CONTRACTOR and COUNTY believe they are creating an independent contractor relationship rather than an employer-employee relationship; and (j) The COUNTY conducts public business.

It is recognized that it is not necessary that all secondary factors support creation of an independent contractor relationship, but rather that overall there are significant secondary factors which indicate that CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor.

By their signatures to this Agreement, each of the undersigned certifies that it is his or her considered judgment that the CONTRACTOR engaged under this Agreement is in fact an independent contractor.

9. <u>CONTRACTOR</u> represents that its operations are in compliance with applicable County planning, environmental and other laws or regulations.

- 10. <u>CONTRACTOR</u> is responsible to pay prevailing wages and maintain records as required by Labor Code Section 1770 and following.

- 11. <u>NONASSIGNMENT.</u> CONTRACTOR shall not assign this agreement without the prior written consent of the COUNTY.
- 12. <u>RETENTION AND AUDIT OF RECORDS</u>. CONTRACTOR shall retain records pertinent to this Agreement for a period of not less than five (5) years **after** final payment under this Agreement or until a final audit report is accepted by COUNTY, whichever occurs first. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to be subject to the examination and audit by the Santa Cruz County Auditor-Controller, the Auditor General of the State of California, or the designee of either for a period of five (5) years after final payment under this Agreement.
- 13. <u>PRESENTATION OF CLAIMS.</u> Presentation and processing of any or all claims arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be made in accordance with the provisions contained in Chapter 1.05 of the Santa Cruz County Code, which by this reference is incorporated herein.

Compensation

Reimbursement requests will be submitted to the County for labor, according to the labor rates specified below, and other expenses approved in advance by County Public Works in carrying out project tasks, with submission of time logs, receipts, and progress reports. Interim reimbursement payments will not exceed the percentage allowed upon completion of each Project Deliverable as described above. Five percent (5%) of the maximum reimbursement amount will be withheld until the final reports and evaluations are submitted and approved by County Public Works.

All work performed will be done by staff at the following rates, which include benefits:

Executive Director (\$38.88/hour)

Education Coordinator (\$3 1.81/hour)

Ecology Instructors & Bilingual Instructors (\$17.95/hour, increasing to \$18.85/hour on November 1, 2000)

The Education Coordinator will handle scheduling of community service projects, the Executive Director and Education Coordinator will undertake planning and coordination of curriculum changes and community service projects, and the Ecology Instructors and Bilingual Instructors will undertake preparation and teaching youths in the program.

The budgets and timeline in this Scope of Work are for planning purposes and may be adjusted with the consent of County Public Works.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Goal

O'Neill Sea Odyssey is incorporated as a non-profit corporation with a mission to provide a hands-on educational experience to encourage the protection and preservation of the living sea. Specific goals of the Divert on Land, Learn at Sea project are:

- To strengthen our O'Neill Sea Odyssey's community service projects and make waste reduction and diversion their focus;
- To add waste reduction to the ecology unit, which is 1/3 of our three hour environmental education program; and
- To provide waste reduction and diversion education to the 3,000 to 4,500 4th through 8th grade students a year who participate in our program.

Target Audience

Contractor offers a free educational program to 4th through 8th grade students from Monterey, San Benito, Santa Clara and Santa Cruz counties, and elsewhere in California, who have completed environmental projects and whose classes have a science curriculum.

Youth recruitment is done via fliers sent to classroom teachers, via area County Offices of Education, through the CREEC (California Regional Environmental Education Coordinators) network, though the use of the news media, through personal contact, from community centers that serve low-income minority youth, and through Contractor's website.

A target of 120 classes is conducted providing instruction to a target of 4,500 youth annually.

A target of 20% of the youths that utilize classes are from disadvantaged areas, primarily Hispanic and poor, or disabled.

All instruction has Spanish language translation available given appropriate advance arrangements.

Education

Contractor provides an ocean-based environmental educational experience in conservation, ecology, navigation, and marine science on board a 6.5foot catamaran sailing in the Monterey Bay.

Contractor utilizes a shore-side Education Center to provide space for lab work and group discussion. The Center includes a computer network to allow students to view data obtained by themselves and other classes

Contractor provides students with information and facilitates discussion on education and career paths to environmental careers, including those in the area of waste reduction, in conjunction with the Marine Advanced Technology Education (MATE) Center. A link to MATE's website is available in the Education Center.

Curriculum

Contractor will develop curriculum on waste reduction and diversion which it will incorporate into the ecology unit, which is one-third of its three hour course. The new curriculum, to teach youth the value that waste stream diversion has in the protection of the environment, will be developed in consultation with the County of Santa Cruz Office of Education to be consistent with the Public Schools Resource Conservation Program curriculum, and will be subject to approval by County Public Works before adoption.

Contractor's ecology curriculum will utilize a watershed model and a bathometric map of the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary to illustrate how waste travels through a watershed and into the Sanctuary.

Community Service Projects

Contractor works closely with the following organizations to coordinate community service projects: 0304 Ecology Action of Santa Cruz, Save Our Shores, the Surfrider Foundation, the Elkhorn Native Plant Nursery, and area schools. Projects are designed to complement rather than duplicate the Surfrider Foundations' storm drain stenciling efforts, Ecology Action's Annual Coastal Cleanup and the Adopt-A-Beach programs, and Save Our Shores' education projects and beach cleanup programs.

A target of 4,500 youth participate in community service projects annually.

Contractor will make waste reduction and diversion the focus of community service projects. A target of 75% of community service projects will focus on reducing or diverting waste from the waste stream, a 5% improvement over the achievement of previous years' projects, which was 70%.

A target of 12,600 pounds of trash and marine debris will be diverted from the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary and associated waterways, and 6,300 pounds of recyclable material will be diverted from area landfills as a result of community service projects.

Community service projects with a waste reduction or diversion focus will include recycling, recycling awareness, school composting, beach cleanups outside of the Annual Coastal Cleanup and Adopt-A-Beach programs, and other projects approved by County Public Works.

Contractor will provide assistance to those classes and community groups that have requested assistance in obtaining ideas for projects, past data on projects by other classes, and on procuring tools for the projects.

Contractor will follow-through with individual classes to ensure that their community service projects are performed.

A database of classes and their community service projects will be developed, and this data will be made available to the County of Santa Cruz Waste Reduction program in order to track progress toward waste reduction and landfill diversion goals and objectives established by AB 939.

Evaluation

Contractor uses an outside evaluator, *United Schools Agency*, to survey reactions from teachers and parent chaperones, as well as a longitudinal reflection on the experience. Contractor will include in the evaluation form a way to track the revised ecology curriculum and community service projects, both for their educational value and for their effectiveness at diverting waste.

Organizational Budget

The Waste Reduction Grant Project Budget is \$24,684 of a total annual Organizational Budget for O'Neill Sea Odyssey of \$335,000. The remainder of the organizational funding is from public and private sources and Contractor's business activities.
