SUBJECT: HAZARDOUS WASTE TRANSPORTATION, RECYCLING AND DISPOSAL

SERVICES CONTRACT

Members of the Board:

On March 21, 2000, your Board approved issuance of a request for proposal for household hazardous waste transportation, recycling and disposal services and directed Public Works to return on June 27, 2000, with an agreement with the selected vendor. Public Works received five bids which are summarized on the attached spreadsheet. Philip Transportation and Remediation, Inc., (Philip) provided the lowest overall cost proposal in addition to its strong qualifications.

Philip has been the County's contractor for household hazardous waste services for the last three years. Based upon the low bid, qualifications, and history of excellent service to the County's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program, we are recommending continuation of these services with Philip.

Attached for your consideration is an agreement for household hazardous waste transportation, recycling and disposal services for the 2000/2001 fiscal year. This agreement will provide for the continuation of Philip's services with unit pricing at or below the previous year's contract. However, this contract does reflect an overall increase of \$25,000 over last year's contract, This increase will be necessary to handle the anticipated costs associated with the new household hazardous waste collection facility to be constructed at the City of Santa Cruz' Dimeo Lane Landfill later this summer. The volume of collected materials is also anticipated to increase, as it has in previous years, due to our expanded public information program and increased public awareness efforts. Public Works will be operating this new facility on behalf of all the incorporated cities and County to better serve the City of Santa Cruz, north coast, and Live Oak area residents. As with the other two collection facilities, the new location will be open to all county and city residents.

On November 16, 1999, your Board approved a resolution supporting a grant application with the California Integrated Waste Management Board to fund this new collection facility. The City of Santa Cruz has been awarded the requested grant funding, which will cover up to \$25,000 of the disposal and transportation cost increases, with the balance being allocated among all the participating cities and county jurisdictions. The grant fund reimbursements are included in the 2000/2001 budget revenues. Sufficient funds are being recommended in the 2000/2001 CSA-9C, Solid Waste Enterprise Fund for this purpose.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Supervisors take the following action:

- Approve the agreement with Philip Transportation and Remediation, Inc., to
 provide transportation, recycling and disposal services for the County's
 Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program in a not-to-exceed amount of
 \$175,000, contingent upon Board approval of the 2000/2001 CSA-9C budget
 and authorize the Director of Public Works to sign the agreement on behalf of
 the County.
- 2. Direct the Clerk of the Board to return one fully executed copy of the agreement to Public Works for further processing.

- 1. <u>DUTIES.</u> CONTRACTOR agrees to exercise special skill to accomplish the following result: PROVIDE TREATMENT AND RECYCLING SERVICES FOR THE COUNTY HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION FACILITIES TO INCLUDE WASTE PROFILING AND APPROVAL SERVICES, TRANSPORTATION MANTFESTING, WASTE DISPOSAL, RECYCLING AND TREATMENT, AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. SEE ATTACHMENT 1 OF THIS AGREEMENT FOR SCHEDULE OF CHARGES.
- 2. <u>COMPENSATION.</u> In consideration for CONTRACTOR accomplishing said result, COUNTY agrees to pay CONTRACTOR as follows: NOT TO EXCEED \$175,000.00, IN A MANNER DESCRIBED IN ATTACHMENT NO. 1: SCOPE OF WORK.
- 3. <u>TERM.</u> The term of this contract shall bc: FROM APPROVAL THROUGH JUNE **30, 2001**.
- 4. <u>EARLY TERMINATION.</u> Either party hereto may terminate this contract at any time by giving 30 days written notice to the other party.
 - 5. INDEMNIFICATION FOR DAMAGES, TAXES AND CONTRIBUTIONS.

CONTRACTOR shall exonerate, indemnify, defend, and hold harmless COUNTY (which for the purpose of paragraphs 5 and 6 shall include, without limitation, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers) from and against:

- A. Any and all claims, demands, losses, damages, defense costs, or liability of any kind or nature which COUNTY may sustain or incur or which may be imposed upon it for injury to or death of persons, or damage to property as a result of, arising out of, or in any manner connected with the CONTRACTOR'S negligent performance under the terms of this Agreement, and excepting any liability arising out of the negligence of the COUNTY. Such indemnification includes any damage to the person(s), or property (ies) of CONTRACTOR and third persons.
- B. Any and all Federal, State and Local taxes, charges, fees, or contributions required to be paid with respect to CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR'S officers, employees and agents engaged in the performance of this Agreement (including, without limitation, unemployment insurance, social security and payroll tax withholding).
 - 6. INSURANCE: CONTRACTOR, at its sole cost and expense, for the full term of

compliance with all of the following insurance coverage(s) and requirements. Such insurance coverage shall be primary coverage as respects COUNTY and any insurance or self-insurance maintained by County shall be excess of CONTRACTOR'S insurance coverage and shall not contribute to it.

If CONTRACTOR utilizes one or more subcontractors in the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall obtain and maintain Independent Contractor's Insurance as to each subcontractor or otherwise provide evidence of insurance coverage for each subcontractor equivalent to that required of CONTRACTOR in this Agreement, unless CONTRACTOR and COUNTY both initial here _____/

- (2) Automobile Liability Insurance for each of CONTRACTOR's vehicles used in the performance of this Agreement, including owned, non-owned (e.g. owned by CONTRACTOR's employees), leased or hired vehicles, in the minimum amount of \$500,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. This insurance coverage shall not be required if vehicle use by CONTRACTOR is not a material part of performance of this Agreement and CONTRACTOR and COUNTY both certify to this fact by initialing here _____/
- (3) Comprehensive or Commercial General Liability Insurance coverage in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit, including coverage for: (a) bodily injury, (b) personal injury, (c) broad-form property damage, (d) contractual liability, and (e) cross-liability.
- (4) Professional Liability Insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000.00 combined single **limit**, if, and only if, this Subparagraph is initialed by CONTRACTOR and COUNTY / -

B. Other Insurance Provisions

(1) If any insurance coverage required in this Agreement is provided on a "Claims Made" rather than "Occurrence" form, CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain the required coverage for a period of three (3) years after the expiration of this Agreement (hereinafter "post agreement coverage") and any extensions thereof. CONTRACTOR may maintain the required post agreement coverage by renewal or purchase of prior acts or tail coverage. This provision is contingent upon post agreement coverage being both available and reasonably affordable in relation to the coverage provided during the term of this Agreement. For purposes of interpreting this requirement, a cost not exceeding 100% of the last annual policy premium during the term of this Agreement in order to purchase prior acts or tail coverage for post agreement coverage shall be deemed to be reasonable.

(2) All required Automobile and Comprehensive or Commercial General Liability Insurance shall be endorsed to contain the following clause:

"The County of Santa Cruz, its officials, employees, agents and volunteers are added as an additional insured as respects the operations and activities of, or on behalf of, the named insured performed under Agreement with the County of Santa Cruz."

(3) All required insurance policies shall be endorsed to contain the following clause:

"This insurance shall not be canceled until after thirty (30) days prior written notice has been given to:

(4) CONTRACTOR agrees to provide its insurance broker(s) with a full copy of these insurance provisions and provide COUNTY on or before the effective date of this Agreement with Certificates of Insurance for all required coverages. All Certificates of Insurance shall be delivered or sent to:

- 7. <u>EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.</u> During and in relation to the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR agrees as follows:
- A. The CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer related), marital status, pregnancy, sex, sexual orientation, age (over 18), veteran status or any other non-merit factor unrelated to job duties. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: recruitment; advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training (including apprenticeship), employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer. The CONTRACTOR agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notice setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.
- B. If this Agreement provides compensation in excess of \$50,000 to CONTRACTOR and if CONTRACTOR employs fifteen (15) or more employees, the following requirements shall apply:

- (1) The CONTRACTOR shall, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the CONTRACTOR, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer related), marital status, pregnancy, sex, sexual orientation, age (over 18), veteran status, or any other non-merit factor unrelated to job duties. In addition, the CONTRACTOR shall make a good faith effort to consider Minority/Women/Disabled Owned Business Enterprises in CONTRACTOR's solicitation of goods and services. Definitions for Minority/Women/Disabled Business Enterprises are available from the COUNTY General Services Purchasing Division.
- (2) The CONTRACTOR shall furnish COUNTY Affirmative Action Office information and reports in the prescribed reporting format (PER 40 12) identifying the sex, race, physical or mental disability and job classification of its employees and the names, dates and methods of advertisement and direct solicitation efforts made to subcontract with Minority/Women/Disabled Business Enterprises.
- (3) In the event of the CONTRACTOR'S non-compliance with the non-discrimination clauses of this Agreement or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders said CONTRACTOR may be declared ineligible for **further** agreements with the COUNTY.
- (4) The CONTRACTOR shall cause the foregoing provisions of this Subparagraph 7B. to be inserted in all subcontracts for any work covered under this Agreement by a subcontractor compensated more than \$50,000 and employing more than fifteen (15) employees, provided that the foregoing provisions shall not apply to contracts or subcontracts for standard commercial supplies or raw materials.
- 8. <u>INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS</u>. CONTRACTOR and COUNTY have reviewed and considered the principal test and secondary factors below and agree that CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor and not an employee of COUNTY. CONTRACTOR is responsible for all insurance (workers compensation, unemployment, etc.) and all payroll related taxes. CONTRACTOR is not entitled to any employee benefits. COUNTY agrees that CONTRACTOR shall have the right to control the manner and means of accomplishing the result contracted for herein.

<u>PRINCIPAL TEST</u>: The CONTRACTOR rather than COUNTY has the right to control the manner and means of accomplishing the result contracted for.

SECONDARY FACTORS: (a) The extent of control which, by agreement, COUNTY may exercise over the details of the work is slight rather than substantial; (b) CONTRACTOR is engaged in a distinct occupation or business; (c) In the locality, the work to be done by CONTRACTOR is usually done by a specialist without supervision, rather than under the direction of an employer; (d) the skill required in the particular occupation is substantial rather than slight; (e) The CONTRACTOR rather than the COUNTY supplies the instrumentalities, tools and work place; (f) The length of time for which CONTRACTOR is engaged is of limited duration rather than indefinite; (g) The method of payment of

CONTRACTOR is by the job rather than by the time; (h) The work is part of a special or permissive activity, program, or project, rather than part of the regular business of COUNTY; (i) CONTRACTOR and COUNTY believe they are creating an independent contractor relationship rather than an employer-employee relationship; and (j) The COUNTY conducts public business.

It is recognized that it is not necessary that all secondary factors support creation of an independent contractor relationship, but rather that overall there are significant secondary factors which indicate that CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor.

By their signatures to this Agreement, each of the undersigned certifies that it is his or her considered judgment that the CONTRACTOR engaged under this Agreement is in fact an independent contractor.

- 9. <u>CONTRACTOR</u> represents that its operations are in compliance with applicable County planning, environmental and other laws or regulations.
- 10. <u>CONTRACTOR</u> is responsible to pay prevailing wages and maintain records as required by Labor Code Section 1770 and following.
- 11. <u>NONASSIGNMENT</u>. CONTRACTOR shall not assign this agreement without the prior written consent of the COUNTY.
- 12. <u>RETENTION AND AUDIT OF RECORDS</u>. CONTRACTOR shall retain records pertinent to this Agreement for a period of not less than five (5) years after final payment under this Agreement or until a final audit report is accepted by COUNTY, whichever occurs first. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to be subject to the examination and audit by the Santa Cruz County Auditor-Controller, the Auditor General of the State of California, or the designee of either for a period of five (5) years after final payment under this Agreement.
- 13. <u>PRESENTATION OF CLAIMS.</u> Presentation and processing of any or all claims arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be made in accordance with the provisions contained in Chapter 1.05 of the Santa Cruz County Code, which by this reference is incorporated herein.
- 14. <u>ATTACHMENTS</u>, This Agreement includes the following attachments: ATTACHMENT NO. 1: SCOPE OF WORK.

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Company Qualifications

This section is written in response to the Santa Cruz County RFP-Company Qualifications. This section is written to provide the County with a thorough understanding of Philip's qualifications for the County's project. Philip's industry experience as well as our specific project team's qualifications will also be reviewed.

1.1 Philip Services Background

Philip Services (Philip) is a fully integrated resource recovery and industrial services company providing steel, copper and aluminum processing and recovery service, solid and liquid by-products recovery, and industrial and remediation services throughout North America. 

1.2.1 Santa Cruz Project Organizational Chart

Todd Wheeler, as *Santa Cruz County Project Manager*, will provide a single and primary point of contact for all County service needs. Todd will be responsible for providing the initial operations review to approve packaging methodologies, assist the County with any required changes in packaging or labeling methodologies, receive all requests for shipment from the County, review, approve and schedule shipments into the Philip Treatment and Recycling Facility, prepare all required shipping documentation, be on-site to assist our transportation personnel with all shipments, be available during the week to respond over the phone to technical questions or concerns the County may have regarding such topics as waste sorting, packaging or labeling and prepare all invoices and billing documents.

Mark Mooney, as *Philip HHW Program Manager*, will serve as a primary point of contact to the County for all tasks relating to contract management, reporting, waste tracking, insurance and customer service. Mark will work closely with Todd to ensure that the County's contractual and operational requirements are fully satisfied in all aspects of service to the Santa Cruz County program.

Kevin Carnaban, as *Philip Director of Operations*, will provide support to Mark in all his duties, and will ensure the local, regional and corporate availability of staff, transportation and administrative resources to service all of Philip's California HHW Program Operations.

1.2.2 Personnel Training

One of the primary functions of the Kent facility is the acceptance and management of Household Hazardous Waste from throughout the western United States and Alaska. This facility has the capability to process both solvent based and latex paint in all size containers, operation of a latex recycling program, closed loop depressurization of aerosol cans, lab pack depacking and consolidation, used oil consolidation for re-refining, oil filter compacting, regulated and non-regulated stabilization and solidification and waste water treatment.

The Kent facility obtained RCRA interim status authorization in 1980. We have submitted a Part B application to Ecology and the EPA, Region 10. This facility currently operates under RCRA interim status authorization. Please see Appendix I for audit information.

Secondary Treatment, Recycling and Disposal Facilities
