

Dear Members of the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors:

We would like to forward the names of those applicants to the Santa Cruz County Resource Conservation District Board whom we recommend for appointment. We are a Subcommittee of the District Board of Directors charged with this task by the Board and are Directors not presently coming to the ends of our terms. Two of us have long-term perspectives of the work of the District and one of us is a first-term appointee. Our own diverse resource conservation backgrounds and experiences qualify us to recognize in applicants criteria which are called for in the District's goals and work plan: representation of (1) various geographic parts of the County and (2) various resource conservation and management backgrounds and technical skills. This is particularly important in a District such as ours, where many conditions and resource management needs are present.

Another consideration is familiarity with the role, goals, and programs of the District. It can take a full two-year term for a person unfamiliar with the District to achieve adequate understanding of the District and its work. This is very important to the Directors' continued guidance and oversight of the District — to move forward with effective natural resource conservation through program identification, funding, implementation, and management — activities largely carried out by District Staff.

There are various areas of expertise and interest which can work together to provide a balance of resource conservation needs. In our District, we have a broad range of landuse conditions, activities, and needs. These include agriculture, development, recreation, silviculture, and animal husbandry. Activities that degrade water quality and stream and riparian habitat are of concern to all of us. There are also serious matters of protection for species of animals and plants faced with the possibility of at-least local extinction.

The District's mission and goals are to provide outreach, education, and technical assistance in various areas of natural resource conservation to, with, and for landowners, individuals, land-use groups, interest groups, and agencies. Included are presentation of workshops, informative literature, on-the-ground technical assistance, and other activities. Many grant-funded programs are now part of this work and projects range from short- to long-term. The District's programs and staff are expanding; this gives the District more opportunity to assist with natural resource conservation in Santa Cruz County and we welcome the opportunity. The District does not advocate particular political (or related) approaches and it has no enforcement role. We believe it is critical that the District not become involved in these issues — in order to serve natural resource conservation in Santa Cruz County best.

We have reviewed the qualifications of the applicants for District Directorship. These candidates are recommended because (1) they are well qualified, (2) they represent the technical background needed on the Board and (3) they have familiarity with the District and its programs. We recommend for new appointment to the Board John Ricker and Michael Manfre, and for reappointment Steven Butler and Howard Liebenberg.

Should you wish to see the Board's composition, we give the following **Information**. Present and remaining **Board** Chair James McKenna is a licensed landscape contractor certified in erosion and drainage **control**, and an apple grower in Mid-County, with many years experience with the District. Director **Roberta** K. Smith is a state-licensed geologist who **practices** land-use geology, with an emphasis on recognition and mitigation of "accelerated" (i.e., human-caused) erosion; she belongs to many environmental and land-use groups and organizations; is from the North Coast, and has been involved with the District for many years. DirectorFrank Rem& is a farmer and businessperson from the **Watsonville** area; he benefited from the **District's** technical programs, became interested in the **District's** work, and is completing his first term as Director.

Director and Director-Applicant Steven Butler is a licensed forester, practicing with a local firm. Steve'is active in watershed management in the San Lorenzo Valley, and has been involved with the District and the California Association of Resource Conservation Districts for several years. He has provided extensive technical assistance to District programs and trainings. In addition, he has facilitated resource management cost-share programs to landowners.

Director and Director-Applicant Howard Liebenberg is an engineering contractor who designs, builds and repairs roads and projects involving grading and other activities. He has practical experience allowing him to know what is physically possible and appropriate to construct; he has taken and taught District workshops to further his and others' knowledge for many years and been a Director for several years.

Director-Applicant John Rkker has been a County employee for many years, with extensive experience working for Environmental Health and Planning. His Knowledge of watershed management, sedimentation, and water quality issues will be an invaluable resource. He lives in rural Mid-County where he is involved in local land management and cooperative private road maintenance; John has worked with the District and its programs for many years.

Director-Applicant Michael Manfre is a long-time native South County farmer who has become familiar with the District through his involvement in the District's Watsonville Sloughs program, a component of the Central Monterey Bay Wetlands Project. As the District's programs expand in the agricultural areas of South County there is an increased need for representation of production agriculture on the Board of Directors.
