SUBJECT: WASTE MANAGEMENT FRANCHISE AMENDMENT

Members of the Board:

As your Board is aware, recycling collection services are provided to the County through an exclusive franchise agreement with Waste Management of Santa Cruz County (WMSCC). The franchise agreement stipulates that WMSCC shall be responsible for the collection, processing and marketing of specified recyclable materials. This processing consists of sorting mixed recyclables into individual material types (e.g., glass, aluminum, cardboard, newspaper, etc.) and baling paper fiber materials (e.g., cardboard, newspaper, etc.) for transportation and marketing efficiencies. Since the inception of the franchise agreement, WMSCC has been processing recyclables at its Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) on Beach Street in Watsonville in accordance with Section 4.1 (G) (iii) of the franchise agreement which states:

(iii) <u>Designation of Recyclables Processing Facility</u>. The County and the Franchisee agree that the designated Recyclables Processing Facility under this Franchise will be located at 1340 West Beach Street, Watsonville, California. The Franchisee shall not process franchise recyclable materials at any other facility without the prior written approval of the County. The design capacity of the facility shall be 100 tons per day. The processing residue shall amount to no more than 3 percent of the total tonnage of material delivered to the recyclables processing facility.

In October 1998, WMSCC indicated an interest in using another **MRF** owned by a sister company based in Monterey County (see Attachment 2). This facility is located in Castroville, about twenty minutes south of Watsonville. At that time, staff requested additional specific information from WMSCC about the effects of such a change, prior to presenting the matter to the Board of Supervisors (see Attachment 3).

On June 1, 2001, WMSCC responded to the staff request for additional information (see Attachment 4). Shortly thereafter, the baling machine at the Watsonville facility broke down and WMSCC was forced, as an emergency measure to keep up with the 70 tons per day of incoming material, to redirect those loads to the Castroville M R F. Attachment 5 is WMSCC's request for emergency use of the Castroville M R F. The Watsonville facility is being used to transfer the recyclables from the smaller collection trucks to larger transfer trucks to minimize the number of vehicles making the extra 40-mile round trip. According to WMSCC's baler inspection report, the cost to repair the broken baler would be around \$100,000 and would take two to three months. Complete replacement of the machine, which is what the service company recommended, would cost about \$300,000 and take three to four months.

On July 27, 2001, Public Works wrote to WMSCC authorizing temporary use of the Castroville facility until September 3, 2001, pending resolution of its request for a permanent transfer of recycling processing activities from the Watsonville **MRF** to the Castroville **MRF** (see Attachment 6). In this letter, staff requested additional information from WMSCC as a follow-up to earlier inquiries about the effects of such a proposed change in processing facilities. Attachment 7 provides WMSCC's response to this follow-up request.

The Castroville **MRF** has two sorting lines, one for bottles and cans and the other for fiber materials (e.g., newspaper, cardboard, junk mail). The Watsonville **MRF** is only large enough to accommodate a single sorting line that is dedicated to bottles and cans only. Fiber materials directed to the Watsonville **MRF** are commingled and sold to recycling markets as a mixed lower grade paper. Staff believes that there will be a benefit to the County from using the Castroville **MRF**, namely that the added sorting line and advanced processing equipment there should enable fiber materials to be sorted more thoroughly and thus capture a better price on the market and direct the materials to a higher and better end use. As the County shares the income from the sale of recyclables on a 50:50 basis, this also means increased revenue back to the County. In conclusion, WMSCC's use of the Castroville **MRF** should provide a more efficient and cost effective processing system for the County's curbside recycling.

Board members have also expressed some concern over the potential loss of local jobs related to this change in WMSCC's recycling operations. We have discussed these concerns with WMSCC and were provided with an outline of the job impacts from the proposed change. WMSCC currently has ten permanent, full-time staff assigned to the Watsonville MRF. All of these ten positions have been reassigned to other jobs as follows; five went to the Castroville MRF, two were retrained as collection drivers, and three remain at the Watsonville MRF to operate the recycling transfer operations. In addition to these ten permanent positions, WMSCC contracted for ten to twelve Skills Center, Inc. workers for the recycling sort line at the Watsonville MRF. During the recent transfer of operations to the Castroville MRF, the contracted Skills Center, Inc. labor was not utilized. We have recently been informed that the Skills Center, Inc. staff that previously worked at the Watsonville MRF have been re-employed in other jobs. In addition, WMSCC is seeking to continue using some Skills Center, Inc. labor for a variety of special projects.

On a related matter, your Board, on August 7, 2001, requested a report from Public Works regarding Waste Management's compliance with the franchise agreement. Two specific questions were posed: 1) Is Waste Management in compliance with the Franchise requirements; and 2) How does Public Works monitor compliance with this contract? These questions arose after your Board heard testimony from several Waste Management drivers during oral communications that they were being asked to work long hours due to driver shortages and truck breakdowns. These drivers indicated that they were often still on the street after 3:00 p.m. (which is the franchise specified deadline for collection operations) and they felt this posed an issue of safety.

With respect to the first question, Public Works believes that Waste Management is in compliance with its franchise requirements. The franchise agreement language does allow for collection operations beyond 3:00 p.m. in cases of emergencies, which we interpret to include equipment breakdown. In addition, the transfer of processing operations to Castroville, as addressed elsewhere in this letter, created a temporary need earlier this summer for extra hours in transit. This has been resolved with a transfer system installed by WMSCC at their Watsonville facility. WMSCC serves the unincorporated county, plus the cities of Scotts Valley and Capitola under separate contracts. The total number of routes for all three jurisdictions and including non-franchised services such as drop-box and commercial cardboard collection is 43. There are 29 routes for the unincorporated county franchise services, as specified in the agreement. Additional drivers have recently been hired to establish a pool of reserve drivers. Outside of limiting the hours of actual route collection, the County cannot specifically limit the use of overtime by WMSCC's employees.

With respect to the second question, there are a number of methods that Public Works uses to monitor compliance in general with the franchise requirements. These include the reporting provisions of the franchise agreement, scheduled and unannounced visits to the WMSCC facility on Beach Drive, and contacts from WMSCC customers and the public at-large, The agreement provides for issuance of monetary fines for customer service related franchise failures to meet franchise requirements. Franchise reporting includes monthly reports on collection performance, quarterly reports on vehicle inspections, and annual reports which include analysis of problems with collections operations, among other things. In addition, the California Highway Patrol conducts a biennial inspection of the franchise fleet and maintenance facility. Copies of these inspection reports are periodically reviewed by staff.

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Supervisors take the following action:

1. Approve the attached amendment to agreement with Waste Management of Santa Cruz County revising the language of Section 4.1 (G)iii) in the franchise agreement specifying the Castroville MRF, 11260 Commercial Parkway, Castroville, California as the designated Recycling Processing Facility.

2. Authorize the Director of Public Works to sign the amendment to agreement on behalf of the County.

AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

The parties hereto agree to amend refuse, recycling and yardwaste services franchise agreement Number 71576 dated February 25, 1997, by and between the COUNTY OF SANTA CRUZ and WASTE MANAGEMENT OF SANTA CRUZ COUNTY, by revising Section 4.1 (G) (iii) of said agreement (attached) designation of recyclables processing facility to stipulate that the designated recyclables processing facility under said franchise shall be located at 11260 Commercial Parkway, Castroville, CA, and that the design capacity of the facility shall have a minimum of 100 tons per day dedicated to Santa Cruz County. All other provisions of said contract shall remain the same.

- **4.** the coordination of Recyclables processing methodologies and technologies with Franchise Recyclable Materials collection services in order to maximize the efficiency and cost effectiveness of diversion of Franchise Recyclable Materials from landfill disposal;
- 5. the marketing of products recovered from the processing of Franchise Recyclable Materials in accordance with the Marketing Plan submitted by the Franchisee under this Franchise for approval by the Director.
- (ii) Payment of Recyclables Processing. Marketing and Residue Disposal Costs. The Franchisee shall be responsible for the payment of all costs and expenses associated with the transportation, processing and marketing of Franchise Recyclable Materials and other Recyclables collected or delivered under this Franchise, including any costs incurred by the Franchisee with respect to the Recyclables Processing Facility. In addition, the Franchisee will bear the costs of and is solely responsible for the proper and lawful disposal of all processing Residues at the Designated Disposal Site.
- (iii) <u>Designation of Recyclables Processing Facility</u>. The County and the Franchisee agree that the designated Recyclables Processing Facility under this Franchise will be located at: 11260 Commercial Parkway, Castroville, California. The Franchisee shall not process Franchise Recyclable Materials at any other facility without the prior written approval of the County. The design capacity of the facility shall have a minimum of 100 tons per day dedicated to the County of Santa Cruz. The processing Residue shall amount to no more than 3 percent of the total tonnage of material delivered to the Recyclables Processing Facility.
- (iv) <u>Personnel</u>. The Franchisee shall work with appropriate community organizations approved by the Director to provide employment opportunities at the Recyclables Processing Facility for developmentally disabled and physically handicapped workers.
- (v) County Designation of Facility in Certain Circumstances. The County may designate an alternative processing facility for the temporary or permanent receipt, storage, and/or processing of Recyclables collected or delivered under this Franchise in the event that the Franchisee is unable, or otherwise fails, to receive and process such Recyclables in accordance to this Franchise. The Franchisee shall be responsible for all costs associated with the use of such alternate facility, including the cost of transportation and the payment of any tipping or processing fees or other costs payable to the owner or operator of any such alternate facility designated by the County due to the unavailability of the Recyclables Processing Facility .
- (vi) <u>Sharing of Revenues from Sale of Recovered Materials</u>. Annually during the term hereof, the Franchisee shall pay to the County a share of the gross revenues received by the Franchisee from the sale of materials recovered from the processing of Franchise Recyclable Materials in accordance with the formula specified in Appendix F.
- (vii) <u>Franchisee Responsibility for Marketing</u>. The County shall have no responsibility for the availability of markets for recycled products, nor shall it have any liability associated with

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Dear Patrick;

After visiting the Castroville MRF last week, I would like you to consider that Waste Management Santa Cruz send the commodities from the county curbside program to the Castroville facility. There are several reasons for asking you to consider this request.

Since the Castroville **MRF** is able to handle larger volumes of material, the finished product is cleaner. The County of Santa Cruz would realize increased revenue from the material being processed at Castroville.

The volume of material at our 1340 Beach St. site has exceeded our predictions and is not big enough to handle the tonnage coming in daily. The Castroville **MRF** has a larger capacity for the storage of material. Since they are able to store the material at the facility, they are able to get a better price from the end markets. We are unable to store the commodities here and have to sell regardless of the price.

We have had concerns about the noise and ventilation at this facility for the MRF workers. This building, we have found, does not lend itself to the changes that are necessary to improve these conditions.

Material will continue to be processed and stored at the 1340 W. Beach St. MRF.

The Castroville facility is **a** larger, newer and cleaner operation. WMSCC will be able to continue MRF tours at that facility. It is safer and designed with tours in mind. We have had concerns about the safety of taking groups through our facility with so much volume and so little space to safely escort people in and around the building.

Please let me know as soon as possible if you think it is feasible to take the curbside material to Castroville. Call if you have any questions or want to discuss this possibility. Thank you for your consideration.

Dear Mr. Moresco:

This letter is in response to your letter dated October 23, 1998, (attached) regarding proposed use of the Castroville Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) to process commodities collected from the County of Santa Cruz Curbside Recycling Program. There appears to be some positive benefits associated with your proposal, however, before we can make a final decision we need for you to supply us with the following information:

- 1. Identify the specific individual materials that will be taken to your Castroville **MRF** for processing. Also, do you have plans to begin with certain materials and then to expand to other materials at a later date?
- 2. Indicate which specific individual materials will continue to be processed at your Beach Street M R F. Please describe any proposed changes in the processing system at Beach Street for these materials. Will you be able to stockpile these materials at Beach Street for optimum market prices?
- 3. Indicate whether any tours will be provided at your Beach Street M R F. We would prefer the use of a local facility to save an hour's driving time, especially for school tours.
- 4. Indicate the proposed start date for processing materials at your Castroville MRF.
- 5. Indicate your proposed method for tracking the following quantities for each material type collected from unincorporated Santa Cruz County proposed to be processed at your Castroville MRF. In particular, indicate how these quantities will be distinguished from materials processed at the Castroville MRF which have been collected by other operations.

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- a. Collected by curbside route
- b. Processed
- c. Sold
- d. Residue
- e. Other information required by Franchise Section 6.7 (E)(iii).
- 6. Provide the County with a clear explanation of how this proposed change will effect local jobs. (i.e., How many jobs will be lost to Monterey County, and if no jobs will be lost, where will the displaced **MRF** workers be reassigned?) **As** you are aware, this was a subject of considerable concern with the Board of Supervisors during the franchise negotiations.

Upon receiving this information we can evaluate the proposed change in processing as it relates to the entirety of the franchise requirements and return to the Board of Supervisors for a formal decision. We appreciate your efforts to establish a more efficient system for handling the county's curbside materials and look forward to working with you on this change.

SUBJECT: REFUSE, RECTCLING AND YARD WASTE SERVICES FRANCHISE-CURBSIDE MATERIALS PROCESSING AT CASTROVILLE MRF

Dear Mr. Mathews:

This letter is in response to your letter dated November 2, 1998, regarding The proposed use of the Castroville Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) to process commodities collected from the County of Santa Cruz Curbside Recycling Program. Prior to making a final decision, you needed me to provide you with information to questions specified in our last correspondence. In response to your questions, I offer the following:

- 1. Waste Management Inc. intends to process all curbside material at the Castroville Facility.
- 2. The Beach Street Facility will be used to transfer and stockpile material collected from the curbside and commercial recycling programs. We plan to continue to weigh and dump material from the routes, to be tracked on our GTS Scale System, the data required by the franchise agreement By using the Beach Street facility to transfer the material, it will help relieve the traffic impact on Highway 1 between the Beach Street facility and Castroville.
- 3. With regard to MRF tours, Waste Management would direct all MRF tours to the Castroville for the following reasons: Castroville has a large training room for education and a large parking area to accommodate visitors. Castroville has a full time recycling education coordinator on- site.
- 4. The facility is designed to accommodate the safe foot traffic from the MRF tours to ensure the utmost regard to the safety of visitors. Waste Management will also consider covering some transportation costs, if reasonable, for tours, if the situation should arise.

- 5. If the process goes as planned, we would like to start processing material some time in June or July 2001.
- 6. All curbside material, as stated earlier in my response, will continue to be tracked on our GTS Scale System at the Beach Street Facility.
- 7. With regard to local job loses, the transfer facility at 1340West Beach will require three positions. Positions open at the Castroville facility will be filled with Waste Management of Santa Cruz employees; and some employees are in the process of training to move to drivers positions which we have always used as advancement process within the company.
- 8. Waste Management's corporate office is requiring all districts to achieve a 20% reduction in energy usage. Waste Management of Santa Cruz's largest usage of energy is the material recycle facility at 1340 West Beach Street. The company is looking at consolidating the Santa Cruz and Castroville MRFs to achieve the maximum productivity with regard to energy usage. By processing at the Castroville facility, Waste Management can achieve the requested reduction in energy as well as continuing to meet the growing demand for processing material as the recycle stream increases.

I hope that answers your concerns. Please contact me with any other questions or concerns you may have. I look forward to continuing this discussion with you.



Dear Jim,

Waste Management Carmel Marina Corporation is pleased to offer its services to process the recyclable materials from Santa Cruz County at our Castroville, California, Material Recovery Facility.

Per our discussions, the collection vehicles will continue to weigh, utilizing your scale system, upon entering your facility on Beach Street in Watsonville. The material weight and pertinent route information will be entered in your scale system, as is presently the case. This will allow you to continue to produce detailed scale reports to meet your customer's requirements.

The materials will be off loaded from the collection vehicles in the designated areas on the tipping floor. All materials will be loaded into transfer trailers via a conveying system. Fully loaded transfer trailers will be driven to our facility at 11260 Commercial Parkway. Upon entering the facility, transfer trailer information will be entered into our scale system noting the date, time, trailer number, origin of material, type of material and weight. The driver will then be directed to the designated tipping area.

It is our intention to audit a sample of Santa Cruz County material for composition on a quarterly basis. These composition studies will allow us to review any fluctuations of a seasonal nature as well as changes in your program, which may affect the revenue share calculation.

Our process for performing a composition study is as follows:

- 9 All material to be included in the study will be staged in a designated area of the tipping floor.
- 9 All conveyor lines and processed material storage bunkers will be cleared of other materials.
- Materials will be sorted by type (i.e., mixed residential fiber will be sorted to NP grade, Mixed Paper grade and OCC grade).
- 9 Materials will then be baled and each bale will be weighed. In the case of commodities that are sold in a loose state, the storage container will be weighed and the container tare weight will be deducted from the total weight.
- ➤ Utilizing the data obtained from weighing each commodity, we will be able to appropriately calculate the weighted average for the revenue sharing that applies to Franchise Recyclable Materials.

Monthly we will be able to review the Tons Received at the Beach Street facility and Castroville facility, Tons Processed at the Castroville facility, Tons Sold from the Castroville facility and Residue. Residue generated from this program can either be baled or shipped loose in open top roll-off containers to Santa Cruz County Landfill.

Dear Mr. Mathews:

This letter is to follow up with additional information with regards to our phone conversation on Tuesday, June 19,2001. This is a formal request to allow Waste Management of Santa Cruz to temporarily transfer the processing of the curbside recycling material to our Castroville facility because of a major mechanical failure at this facility.

Western Baler is to access the reason for the failure and make a recommendation on what action to take to repair it and give an assessment of the length of time the baler will be out of service. I will keep you informed as I receive feedback from Western Baler on the situation.

As stated in my letter sent May 18,2001, Waste Management has concerns about the facility at 1340 West Beach having the capacity to continue to processing the material due to volume of material received as a result of increased participation levels.

After I receive information from the baler repair company, and if I find that the repairs could take a longer period of time than anticipated, it may be in the best interest of both the County of Santa Cruz and Waste Management to use this time to begin the process of upgrading the West Beach Street facility to transfer material to Castroville. This decision will be determined on the time frame that it will take to repair the baler.

If you would like, I am available to meet with you and Tom Bolich to discuss this interest that is so vital to both the County of Santa Cruz and Waste Management.



SUBJECT: EMERGENCY USE OF CASTROVILLE MATERIALS RECOVERY FACILITY

Dear Mr. Moresco:

In response to your letter of June **20**, 2001 (attached), we have reviewed your request to temporarily transfer recyclable materials to Waste Management's Castroville Materials Recovery Facility (MRF). Your letter and the attached quotation for repairs of your bailer clearly indicate the temporary transfer of operations is essential to maintaining recycling services for Santa **Cruz** County residents. Based upon the information you provided, the repairs could take up to twelve weeks to complete. We are therefore approving this emergency transfer of MRF operations to your Castroville plant through Monday, September **3**, 2001.

You have also informed us that you are planning upgrades to the Watsonville MRF to facilitate permanent transfer of material recovery operations to the Castroville plant. You have also requested approval for a permanent relocation of MRF operations to the Castroville plant. Please be advised that this temporary, emergency authorization to change MRF operations does not constitute approval of a permanent change in MRF designation as required under Section 4.1(G)(iii) of the Franchise Agreement. Permanent dismantling of your sorting facility is not approved until such time as the Board of Supervisors considers and approves your request. The County Board of Supervisors must approve this change through an amendment to the Franchise Agreement.

In a related matter, we have attached a list of follow-up questions related to your request to permanently move MRF operations to Castroville. Please provide a written response to these questions by August 17,2001. Your responses to these questions are necessary to assist us in explaining to the Board of Supervisors what the benefits would be of your requested changes, as well as addressing their concerns over potential impacts to County refuse and recycling services. The Board of Supervisors has also expressed a strong desire to maintain local jobs related to your franchise agreement. Please include in your written response an outline of now your existing MRF employees and contracted Skills Center Labor will be impacted by this proposed change in operations.

We have also attached a letter from Monterey County, outling a potential financial conflict with your requested move to the Castroville MRF. - 3) Will Santa Cruz County be subject to funding for these improvements for the duration of our use of this facility?
- 4) Will our financial liability extend the full term of Monterey County's franchise agreement or terminate concurrent with the Santa Cruz County Franchise Agreement?

Please provide the requested written responses no later than August 17,2001, so we have adequate time to respond to Board member questions in advance of the August 27, 2001, scheduled hearing on your Franchise Agreement amendment.
