RE: ASSEMBLY BILL **1864 -** LEGISLATION TO INCREASE PAJARO VALLEY WATER SUPPLY

Dear Members of the Board:

As you know, the original Pajaro Valley Water Agency Act, written in 1984, allowed the Agency to fund supplemental water projects that used flood or imported water. Since then, improved technology has made it possible to augment water supplies using recycled water.

Assembly Member Simon Salinas has introduced Assembly Bill 1864 to give the Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency the authority to develop projects that capture recycled water. This would provide about 4,000 acre-feet of water for the Pajaro Valley that would otherwise go unused, thus helping the Pajaro Valley's seawater intrusion problems.

I believe this legislation is worthy of our support. Accordingly, I recommend that the Board take the following actions:

- 1. Adopt the attached resolution supporting Assembly Bill 1864.
- 2. Direct the Clerk of the Board to distribute the resolution as indicated.

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3. Direct the County Administration Officer to place the Bill in our legislative tracking system.

WHEREAS, the original Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency Act, written in 1984, was based on the limited technology of the time and allowed the Agency to fund supplemental water projects that use flood or import water; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 1864 would provide the Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency the authority to develop projects that capture recycled water; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 1864 would provide 4,000 acre-feet of water for the Pajaro Valley that would otherwise go unused; and

WHEREAS, passage of Assembly Bill 1864 is a key element in solving the Pajaro Valley's seawater intrusion problem.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors hereby urges the passage of Assembly Bill 1864.

An act to amend Section 316 of the Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency Act (Chapter 257 of the Statutes of 1984), relating to water.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1864, as introduced, Salinas. Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency.

Existing law, the Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency Act, grants to the Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency various powers for the purposes of water management within its boundaries, including the power to regulate groundwater replenishment programs and recapture supplemental groundwater made available by these programs. The act declares that the purpose of the agency is to manage existing and supplemental water supplies to ensure sufficient water supplies €or present and anticipated needs. The act defines "supplemental water" to mean water imported from outside the watershed of the groundwater basin and certain conserved flood waters.

This bill would modify the definition of supplemental water to include recycled water.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 316 of the Pajaro Valley Water Management Agency Act (Chapter 251 of the Statutes of 1984) is amended to read:

Sec. 316. "Supplemental water" means surface water or groundwater imported from outside the watershed or watersheds of the groundwater basin $\frac{}{}$ and $\frac{}{}$, flood waters that are conserved and saved within the watershed or watersheds which would otherwise have been lost or would not have reached the groundwater basin $\frac{}{}$, and recycled water $\frac{}{}$.
