SUBJECT: 2002/03 Proposition 36 Plan and Related Actions

Dear Members of the Board:

The Health Services Agency (HSA) requests that your Board's adopt the attached resolution approving the attached 2002-03 Proposition 36 Plan and authorizing the Health Services Administrator to sign. In addition, HSA requests that your Board approve six 2001/02 contract amendments totaling \$418,857 for additional Proposition 36 and CalWORKs drug treatment services; authorize HSA to sign the amendments; and adopt the attached resolution accepting and appropriating \$427,888 in unanticipated revenue into the HSA Alcohol and Drug Program budget.

Background

On May 22, 2001, your Board approved the County's 2001-02 plan to implement Proposition 36, which provides for drug treatment instead of incarceration for certain classes of drug offenders. In prior actions, your Board designated HSA as the lead agency for local Proposition 36 implementation, and established a trust fund for deposit of Proposition 36 revenues as required by Proposition 36. On February 5,2002, HSA provided your Board with a status report on Proposition 36 implementation, and requested authorization to negotiate amendments to contracts for Proposition 36 drug treatment services to accommodate growth in needed services. Since February, the rate of growth in needed Proposition 36 services has been higher than projected, and contract amendments to provide additional drug treatment services are needed.

On March 5,2002 the State informed HSA that the 2002-03 County Proposition 36 Plan is due to the State on May 1, 2002. HSA has worked closely with the Proposition 36 Steering Committee to develop the plan, and has conducted a public meeting to obtain input to the plan from community members, drug treatment contractors, the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Commission, and the public.

2002-03 Proposition 36 Plan

The attached 2002-03 County Proposition 36 Plan is based on the 2001-02 plan, and incorporates experience from the last year of Proposition 36 implementation as well as input from the community. Highlights of program goals for the upcoming year include improved services for mentally ill drug offenders whose mental illness is not severe enough to meet Community Mental

Health target population criteria, increased residential drug treatment and detoxification services, full implementation of drug testing protocols, and improved collection of client fees.

The plan projects that \$1.173 million will be needed for drug treatment services and \$74,108 or drug testing for an estimated 477 clients. Referral and case management services provided by the HSA Alcohol and Drug Program will be allocated \$1 81,580 and Probation is allocated \$190,421 for supervision of Proposition 36 probationers. The allocations for HSA and Probation are consistent with the 5-year projected budget contained in the Proposition 36 Implementation Plan approved by your Board on May 22,2001, except that Probation is allocated an additional \$4,000 to upgrade a vacant Probation Aide position to a Deputy Probation Officer II. This upgrade will provide Probation with an increased amount of staff flexibility to manage the higher than anticipated workload associated with Proposition 36 offenders. These allocation amounts will be included in HSA and Probation's 2002-03 budget requests.

Due to a Proposition 36 trust fund balance resulting from start-up savings, it appears that there will be sufficient Proposition 36 funds to cover projected 2002-03 expenditures. However, the trust fund balance is projected to be exhausted by the end of 2002-03, and it appears unlikely that there will be sufficient Proposition 36 funds to cover all of the cost of services in 2003-04 and subsequent years. Many other counties are projecting similar ongoing funding shortfalls, and HSA is working at the State level to advocate for adequate funding to meet this treatment service mandate. HSA will track Proposition 36 expenditures and, if necessary, seek additional revenues or more closely control costs. If no other alternatives can be found, Proposition 36 clients can be referred to existing County-funded drug treatment services with resultant increases in waiting lists for these services and potential displacement of drug abusers who are not involved with the criminal justice system.

Contract Augmentations

On February 5, 2002 your Board authorized HSA to negotiate amendments to agreements with Proposition 36 service providers cover additional projected expenditures through June 30,2002. These projections were based on year-to-date expenditures through November 30,2001. Based on actual expenditures through the end of February 2002, it appears that additional funds will be needed to cover recently updated expense projections. HSA has developed six contract amendments based on these updated projections for the service providers and amounts shown below. The total augmentation amounts shown below include the augmentations approved by your Board on February 5,2002. Augmentations were negotiated according to the unit of service rates and terms in the existing agreements with these agencies. In addition to the Proposition 36 augmentations, the Santa Cruz Community Counseling Center amendment includes \$39,622 of additional CalWORKs services. Funding for the additional CalWORKs services will be obtained through decreasing the allocations of other contractors that are under-performing on CalWORKs services.

Funding

Current appropriations of Proposition 36 trust funds into the HSA Alcohol and Drug Program budget are sufficient to cover a portion of the contract augmentations, and liquidation of amounts in under-utilized Proposition 36 and CalWORKs contracts will provide additional appropriations to offset the amendments listed above. However, an additional appropriation of \$234,887 of Proposition 36 trust funds is needed to offset the contract augmentations listed above. In addition, \$193,001 of unanticipated Drug Medical funds are being appropriated to provide funding for additional Drug Medical services. These contract augmentations will not result in any increase in net County cost.

It is, therefore, RECOMMENDED that your Board:

- Adopt the attached resolution approving the attached 2002-03 Proposition 36 County Plan and authorizing the Heath Services Administrator to sign; and
- Adopt the attached resolution accepting and appropriating \$427,888 in unanticipated Proposition 36 and Drug Medical revenues into the HSA Alcohol and Drug Program budget; and
- 3. Approve amendments to the agreements with: The Camp Recovery Center, Contract No. 2536, increasing the maximum amount by \$23,074 to \$51,732, Fenix Services, Contract No. 796, increasing the maximum amount by \$21,813 to \$567,030, Janus of Santa Cruz, Contract No. 133, increasing the maximum amount by \$57,622 to \$1,499,400, New Life Community Services, Contract No. 2537, increasing the maximum amount by \$143,537 to \$217,686, Santa Cruz Community Counseling Center, Contract No. 100, increasing the maximum amount by \$117,300 to \$1,720,249, and Sobriety Works, Contract No. 2535, increasing the maximum amount by \$55,511 to \$184,551 and authorize the Health Services Administrator, or as their designee the Director of Administration, to sign.

1. Collaborative Process

The 2002-03 Santa Cruz County Proposition 36 Plan is built upon the foundation of the 2001-02, and revised to include new information gained over the past year.

The Health Services Agency is the lead agency for Proposition 36 implementation, and convenes the Proposition 36 Steering Committee monthly. Representation on the Proposition 36 Steering Committee includes the following:

- courts
- District Attorney
- Public Defender
- Defense Bar
- Probation
- Health Services Agency
- State Parole
- Sheriff
- County Administrative Office
- Criminal Justice Council
- Community Mental Health

The Steering Committee reviews all aspects of Proposition 36 implementation, including policy, planning, programs, staffing and finances. Once each quarter, the Steering Committee conducts a public meeting that is widely noticed and complies with the Brown Act. Alcohol and drug treatment providers and provider associations receive notices of these meetings. In addition, meetings with alcohol and drug treatment providers, sober living housing providers, and other groups are conducted **as** the need to address specific issues arises. Finally, the County Alcohol and Drug Abuse Commission is kept apprised of Proposition 36 planning and implementation issues and is provided the opportunity for input at its monthly meetings.

2. Treatment Providers and Services

The County's Proposition 36 implementation plan is founded upon the values of close collaboration and cooperation among the stakeholders to promote client recovery, ensure client accountability, and protect public safety. Elements of the service provision plan include client flow, assessment, referral, provision of alcohol and drug treatment services, and case monitoring.

Assessment, Treatment Recommendations and Referral

To facilitate coordination of case handling, improve efficiency and increase consistency of defendants' probation and treatment requirements, the courts assign all Proposition 36 cases and Drug Court cases to a single court. At the initial court hearing, out-of-custody

clients are instructed to contact the **HSA** Alcohol and Drug Program (ADP) for an assessment, and are given a second court hearing date approximately 10 days after the first court hearing to review the treatment placement recommendations. ADP is notified by Probation within two days of the initial court hearing that the client needs to be assessed. If the client does not contact ADP within a specified time period, ADP notifies Probation, For out-of-custody clients, ADP has established a standard to assess the client and make placement recommendations back to the court within 10 days of receiving the referral (i.e., in time for the second court hearing). For in-custody clients, ADP's standard is to conduct the assessment and make a report back to the court within 7 days of receiving the referral.

ADP staff conducts **an** alcohol and drug assessment with the client (see below for details of the assessment process), finds an appropriate program to provide the services, and sends a written report of the assessment and treatment recommendations to the court and Probation. Needs for ancillary services (literacy training, vocational and family counseling, mental health and medical services) are also assessed using a brief screening instrument, and service recommendations developed. If a more extensive assessment of ancillary needs (e.g., learning disabilities) is required, the client is referred out to community resources for the assessment.

Fee assessments are also conducted, and clients are re-assessed for fees if their employment status changes. A goal of the Proposition 36 Steering Committee for 2002-03 is to fully implement the client fee assessment and collection system.

Parolees who qualify under Proposition 36 are also referred to **HSA** Alcohol and Drug Program staff, who conducts assessments and make treatment plan recommendations for approval by the Board of Prison Terms. Parolee's compliance with treatment requirements is tracked by Parole, based on reports from treatment providers.

Based on ADP treatment recommendations and a Probation risk assessment, the court orders a treatment placement and gives the client an enrolment deadline. The treatment provider is notified by Probation to expect the client. If the client does not arrive at the treatment provider within the enrollment deadline, the treatment provider notifies Probation.

Treatment Services

Treatment services are provided in three levels of intensity (tracks):

• Track I: Three months of weekly outpatient education and counseling services, provided primarily in a group format, similar to the existing PC 1000 Deferred Judgment Program. Topics include the effects of alcohol and drugs, the addiction and recovery process, and family dynamics. Ancillary services are provided through referral or directly. The goals of Track I services are to help clients examine the impact of alcohol and drug use on their lives, and motivate them toward recovery.

- Track 11: Up to six months of outpatient services, which may be augmented by up to three months of clean and sober housing. Ancillary services are provided through referral or directly.
- Track 111:Up to one year of intensive treatment services based upon an individualized case plan developed by ADP. Services may include detoxification, residential treatment, clean and sober housing, outpatient, and methadone maintenance. Ancillary services are provided through referral or directly.

Reporting from the treatment provider to Probation include quarterly progress reports as required by Proposition 36, and reporting on an exception basis for clients who are non-compliant with court orders for treatment.

As needed, clients who are not succeeding in treatment are referred back to ADP for reassessment and revision of their case plan. Consistent with Proposition 36 requirements, drug treatment services do not exceed 12 months and aftercare services do not exceed 6 months.

A goal of the Proposition 36 Steering Committee is to increase the availability of dual diagnosis services, and residential and detoxification treatment.

Ancillary Services

Ancillary services such as vocational training and literacy training are provided primarily through referrals to existing County-operated and community-based programs supported with non-Proposition 36 funds. In addition, Proposition 36 funds are allocated to a community-based agency to provide case funds to be used at the discretion of the ADP Case Managers for ancillary services which cannot be obtained through other means.

Supervision and Monitoring

Probation has primary responsibility for tracking client compliance with mandated treatment services, based on information from ADP and providers. The level of supervision is based on a public safety risk assessment, level of treatment (track), and treatment phase (early recovery vs. aftercare/recovery maintenance). Supervision is based on reports from treatment providers and drug tests, and may include home and field visits.

For clients who are not complying with treatment requirements or for whom additional service needs are identified, Probation works with ADP, the treatment provider and the court to revise the service plan and/or determine that the client is unamenable to treatment.

3. SACPA Client Treatment Goals

The overall goals for SACPA clients are to attain stable sobriety and become productive members of society. Specific client objectives are to:

- Eliminate or significantly reduce alcohol and drug use
- No further criminal justice system involvement
- Stable employment and/or education
- Stable housing
- Clean and sober social support network
- Address health and mental health needs
- Family reunification, where appropriate
- Address any outstanding legal issues

4. Monitoring Quality of Treatment Services

County contracts provide for monitoring of service providers using criteria consistent with ADP program certification standards. Contracts include goals related to specific program areas (e.g., productivity, staff training, cultural competence, and dual diagnosis), and providers are required to report quarterly on attainment of goals in these areas. County case managers track the progress of clients through programs, and intervene to address program quality issues as they arise in the course of a client's .treatment. As needed, program quality issues are escalated to the management level, and written corrective action plans may be required.

5. Monitoring Quality of Ancillary Services

Most ancillary services (such as vocational readiness, job development and literacy) are provided through referral to the County Human Resources Agency or to private non-profit providers using non-Proposition 36 funds. In addition, Proposition 36 funds are allocated to a community-based agency to provide case funds to be used at the discretion of the ADP Case Managers for ancillary services which cannot be obtained through other means.

County case managers track the progress of clients through programs, and intervene to address program quality issues as they arise in the course of a client's treatment. **As** needed, program quality issues are escalated to the management level. The County Alcohol and Drug Program has a strong working relationship with the Human Resources Agency, and issues are typically resolved between managers at the two agencies. For issues involving contract agencies that cannot be resolved at the Case Manager's level, management may intervene and written corrective action plans may be required.

6. Assessment and Referral Process

ADP staff conducts a thorough assessment of each client using the Addiction Severity Index (ASI) Lite, and develops treatment recommendations using the American Society

of Addiction Medicine Patient Placement Criteria. Both of these tools are research-tested, used nation-wide, and are consistent with best practice standards for the field. Needs for ancillary services (literacy training, vocational **and** family counseling, mental health and medical services) are also be assessed and service recommendations developed. The client flow and referral process are described in Section 2. above.

7. Drug Testing

Drug testing (including alcohol testing) is required of all Proposition 36 clients, and is conducted by treatment providers and Probation Department staff. Testing is randomized and observed. Clients in Track I (once per week outpatient for up to 3 months) are tested once per week. Track 11 (up to 6 months of outpatient treatment which may include up to 3 months of sober living) clients are tested twice per week for the first three months of treatment and once per week thereafter. Track III clients (all other more intensive treatment modalities) are tested twice per week, unless they are in a closely supervised residential treatment program where they may be tested less frequently at the discretion of the program. The testing regimen described above are the default option used for most clients. Testing regimen may be customized for clients based on individual client's needs. Testing may also be done on suspicion of drug use. The Proposition 36 Steering Committee has a goal for 2002-03 to fully implement the drug testing protocol.

Presumptive tests (e.g., strips) are conducted, with samples sent for laboratory confirmation if the client does not acknowledge drug use after being confronted with the presumptive test results. Providers must telephone Probation with positive results within one working day of receiving the positive result. Providers accompany their report of a positive drug test with a recommended treatment response. Probation, in consultation with the County Alcohol and Drug Program Case Manager, reviews and approves or modifies the treatment response. If needed, clients may be re-assessed by the County Case Manager for modification of the treatment plan, including placement in a higher level of care.

The Santa Cruz County Proposition 36 Team has adopted the philosophy that the power of the criminal justice system should be used to promote recovery while protecting public safety. Factors to be considered in responding to a positive drug test include the client's treatment attendance, treatment phase, progress in treatment (e.g., stage of recovery, progress in employment/education and family/social supports), prior positive tests, response to the positive test, and any public safety issues associated with the drug use (e.g., DUI).

Consistent with Health and Safety Code Division 10.9, Section 11999.20, the results of **a** drug test are not used as the basis for imposition of a new criminal charge. In addition, a single drug test is not the sole basis for determining unamenability to treatment or revoking probation.

8. Tracking Service Provision

All Proposition 36 clients are tracked using the County Alcohol and Drug Program's Ecco Drug and Alcohol System (DAS) software. Information on each client assessed by County Case Managers is entered into DAS, and a DAS episode is opened by each treatment provider. DAS can generate reports on the number of unique clients, client demographics, the number of treatment admissions by program and modality, and a host of other variables. Referrals to ancillary services are tracked and reported on by the County Case Manager.

Original Plan Questions for Fiscal Year 2002/2003, Version 2

FOR COST **REIMBURSEMENT** CONTRACTS (DRUG COURT): County agrees to pay Contractor a total **sum** not to exceed Two Hundred Ninety-four **Thousand**, Nine Hundred Eightyone and No/100 dollars (\$294,98 1.00) for services performed during the term of **this** Agreement, based **on** reimbursement of allowable costs.

FOR DRUG MEDI-CAL **CONTRACTS**: County agrees to pay Contractor a **total sum** not to exceed Forty-eight Thousand, Five Hundred Forty-one and No/100 Dollars (\$48,541.00) for Drug Medical services, **as** follows:

a. \$48,541.00 of Minor Consent State Drug Medi-Cal Funds **for** services performed during the term of this Agreement, based on reimbursement of allowable costs.

In no event shall County be required to pay for the cost of services which are covered by **funding** received by Contractor from other governmental contracts or grants.

Contractor shall be paid only for Drug Medi-Cal units of service approved by the State. County shall not be required to pay Contractor for any Drug Medi-Cal units of service denied or disallowed by the State.

In addition, contractor will provide Client Progress Reports in accordance with County protocols established in compliance with federal regulations governing Confidentiality of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Patient Records, 42 C.F.R Part 2.
- e. <u>DRUG AND ALCOHOL TESTING</u>: All Proposition 36 clients will be randomly tested using standard urinalysis and breathalyzer tests as ordered by the Court. A drug and alcohol test is defined as an all-inclusive unit of service that includes collecting, handling, initial and confirmatory assaying, and reporting on a drug and alcohol specimen. Tests shall be conducted randomly and administered according to American Probation and Parole Guidelines for drug testing and County protocols. Advance Base does not include 15% of Federal Medical funds if applicable as outlined in the Fiscal Provisions in Exhibit C.8, Drug Court, or Drinking Driver Assessment funds. PRIMARY PROBLEMS TREATED

The ALTO Counseling Center treats a constellation of chemical dependence problems including educational deficits, unemployment, financial difficulties, health concerns, family problems, and criminal justice system involvement. Program services are designed on the basis of the severity of these chemical dependency problems and the wide scope of client needs. These factors require that traditional therapy services be combined with comprehensive assessment, intense clinical consultation, and extensive support services. The program provides services to the following under-served populations: poly drug abusers, female drug abusers, Latinos and individuals from these target populations who are involved with the criminal justice system.

PROGRAM GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

GOAL I. To provide comprehensive intake/assessment and outpatient counseling services to substance abusing adults. Intake services will include: assessment of impact of drug use and degree of dysfunction in the areas of psychosocial, education/vocational, and justice system involvement, and medical review of health history for obtaining physical exams as needed. Outpatient services will include individual counseling, group counseling and family therapy as determined by client needs.

FOR DRUG MEDI-CAL CONTRACTS: COUNTY agrees to pay CONTRACTOR a total **sum** not to exceed Eighty Thousand, Seven Hundred Four and No/100 Dollars (\$80,704.00) for Drug/MediCal services, **as** follows:

- (a) \$40,352.00 State General Fund Match to Drug/MediCal and
- (b) \$40,352.00 Federal Drug/MediCal funds,

for services performed during the term of this Agreement, based on reimbursement of allowable costs.

In no event shall COUNTY be required to pay for the cost of services which are covered by funding received by CONTRACTOR **from** other governmental contracts or grants.

CONTRACTOR shall be paid only for Drug Medi-Cal units **of** service approved by the State. COUNTY shall not be required **to** pay CONTRACTOR for any Drug Medi-Cal **units of** service denied or disallowed by the State.

Janus maintains a counseling center which provides outclient services in a drug-free, non-drinking environment. Recovery services are provided by degreed/licensed and experienced personnel for individuals and family members affected by alcohol problems. These services include personal recovery planning, individual and group therapy sessions, information about alcoholism, and identification and referral services. **Interns** and qualified volunteers are utilized to assist in the delivery of these services whenever possible.

PRIMARY PROBLEMS TREATED

Janus of Santa Cruz maintains a 19-bed, 28-day, residential treatment center for men and women who have become dependent on alcohol and/or other drugs. Group and individual counseling, educational, recreational, family, aftercare and referral services are provided by well-trained personnel. Both degreed and paraprofessional staff are employed and supervised by experienced and licensed professionals.

The Janus staff believes in each resident's effectiveness, drive for health, and ability to discipline him/herself. To enhance these competencies the program coordinates (1) supervised and unsupervised house groups; (2) formal and informal contact with members of Alcoholics Anonymous; (3) education on the effects of alcohol, alcoholism, and drug abuse; (4) education on how to effectively use the program of Alcoholics Anonymous; and, (5) specifically designed tools for re-entry into the community as a sober, responsible individual. All admissions into the program are on a voluntary basis only.

In addition to providing residential treatment services to local residents under funds **from** the County, Janus offers these services to others, both local and out-of-County, who **are** able to pay for these services or who have a **thiid** Party **payor**.

PROGRAM GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

- GOAL I. Janus will operate and maintain 19 residential treatment beds with an average occupancy rate or 85% for residents of Santa Cruz County in accordance with the "Standards for Direct Alcohol Treatment Services" published by the State Department of Alcohol and Drug programs, and the "County Monitoring Manual For Treatment Providers," prepared by the State Division of Drug programs.
 - **OBJECTIVE A.** RESIDENTIAL 28-DAY. Janus will provide residential treatment with an average length of treatment **of** 22 days to men and women, age 18 and over, who are dependent on alcohol **and/or** other **drugs.**
 - A.1. County clients: 1,898 bed days per year to 78 clients. Of these, 71 bed days will be provided to 3 **Drug Court** clients. **To** extend the **units** of service that **are** provided from public funding Janus will encourage County clients to participate financially in their own recovery by charging **for** residential services according to each individual's ability to pay. No County client will be turned away because of inability to pay.
 - A.2. CalWORKs clients: 227 bed days per year to **8** clients. Additional support services for CalWORKs clients will address barriers to employment.
 - A.3. Proposition 10 clients: **24** bed days per year **to** 1 clients. Janus. will provide client updates to HSA and HRA caseworkers as required by COUNTY protocols.

- **A.4.** 362 bed days per year to **15** Proposition 36 clients. Janus will collect fees designated by the **Court** for Proposition 36 clients and provide monthly accounting to HSA and Probation. In addition, random alcohol and **drug** testing will be provided **as** ordered by the court, and ancillary services will be provided through referral or directly.
- OBJECTIVE B. RESIDENTIAL SERVICES FOR HOMELESS CLIENTS. Janus will provide residential treatment with an average length of treatment of 22 days to Homeless adults age 18 and over referred from the Homeless Persons Health Project (HPHP) who are dependent upon alcohol and/or other drugs.
 - **B.**1. Janus will provide **340** bed days **of** Residential Services to 16 Homeless Clients per year. In addition, Janus will provide:
 - a. Transportation to assist with entry into the program, when possible.
 - b. Steady communication and close coordination with the Santa Cruz County Homeless Persons Health Project (HPHP) in order to effectively link case management and treatment services for homeless clients and maximize the chance that recovery efforts may be successful and sustained through the following:
 - (1) All Homeless Persons Health Project (HPHP) clients will be informed at intake that their 28-day program at Janus is linked to HPHP. Clients will be informed about what services HPHP offers, and that an HPHP case coordinator will be contacting them to arrange an appointment to take place in the third week of their program.
 - **(2)** All *HPHP* clients will be asked at the time **of** intake to sign an authorization for release of information to *HPHP* Case Coordinator.
 - (3) The Janus case manager for *HPHP* clients **will** be responsible for contacting HPHP Substance Abuse **Case** Coordinator to **begin** coordination of care for clients within **5** days of the client's entry into Janus.
 - (4) After two weeks **a** care Janus **staff** will help facilitate regular contact between the *HPHP* Coordinator and the *HPHP* client according to the client's need and interest.
 - (5) Janus will continue to support HPHP clients in recovery, aftercare, relapse prevention and issues related to homelessness after the 28-day program is over.
 - (6) Janus staff and HPHP staff will meet at least once per quarter to review successes and failures of recovery efforts of homeless clients, in order to identify ways in which program efforts or coordination can be changed to create more successes.

PRIMARY PROBLEMS TREATED

Janus **of** Santa Cruz maintains an **8** bed Special Care Unit for alcohol and drug dependent men and women. **The** unit provides crisis support for the acutely intoxicated during the period **of** withdrawal. Other services include assessment and referral for individuals requiring medical and/or long term rehabilitation, and treatment focusing on intervention and placement into the continuum **of** alcohol and **drug** services. Services are provided twenty-four hours a day by trained and experienced **staff**.

Philosophically, Janus is committed to personal responsibility for one's good health and abstinence from alcohol and drugs. Admission to the Special Care Unit is voluntary and continued participation in the program, while strongly encouraged, is not forced on the individual. During a participant's stay in the Special Care Unit they receive daily staff assessment to determine the appropriateness of continuing care. On the basis of individual assessment, discharge and/or referral may take place at the point when an individual is stabilized and no longer deemed to be intoxicated, or, in the case of medical and/or long term rehabilitation, when a suitable placement has been identified. Continuation of services beyond a 48-hour period are conditioned on a positive assessment of the individual's anticipated response to intervention and entry into a continuum of treatment. Participation in the pre-treatment program is anticipated to last three to six days.

Pre-treatment services provide a daily program **of** alcohol and **drug** education, group and individual counseling, attendance at AA meetings, self-assessment activities and treatment planning. **In** addition, trained **staff is** provided to assist participants in resolving legal, **socio/economic** and familial problems which may present barriers to treatment.

PROGRAM GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

- GOAL I. Janus **will** operate **and maintain** a social setting Special Care Unit in accordance with the "Standards for Direct Alcohol Treatment Services" and the "County Monitoring Manual for Treatment Providers" published by the State Department **of** Alcohol and Drug Programs.

- Designates the Health Services Agency as the lead agency of Santa Cruz County's Substance Abuse and Crime Prevention Act of 2000 responsibilities and;
- Assures that the County of Santa Cruz shall comply with the provisions of the Substance Abuse and Crime Prevention Act of 2000 and the California Code of Regulations, Title 9, Division 4, Chapter 2.5; and
- Assures that the County of Santa Cruz has established a trust fund; and
