On Saturday, March 15, 2003, more than 700 people packed the Kentucky Theatre in Lexington, KY for a similar event, with a similar response from the audience.

At the launch of Imagine America in Santa Cruz, Sara Nelson pointed out to the gathering of visionary activists that the Baby Boomers and the Millennials (late '70s- mid '90s generation) are the two biggest generation ever in the history of the world, representing unprecedented potential, a huge economic and social force that has the power together to shift the world - intergenerational learning and action is key.

Think like a mother was Bliss Browne's profound insight in their early exploration of "Faith, Imagination and Public Life": "This new work would likely require hope, attention and faithfulness to life's promise and mystery more than it would require ambition and strategy."

The understanding, that in a true economy "unemployed" is an oxymoron (a moronic concept to boot), is integrated in Paul Hawken's *Ecology of Commerce*, in his and the Lovins' *Natural Capitalism*, in Bioneers thinking... We must catch and weave every thread already spun as we move into *Imagine Santa Cruz...*
