Re: Salvageable wood from the Redman-Hirahara House barn

Santa Cruz County Historical Resources Commission (HRC) is appointed by the County Board of Supervisors. For many years, commissioners have observed the slow deterioration of the Redman-Hirahara house and nearby barn. Last winter, the barn collapsed and the remains will soon be demolished by the property owners.

The main house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, but the barn was left out when the designation was given. An archaeological team led by Rob Edwards more recently performed a study at the barn and discovered its importance to many Japanese Americans who returned to California and lived there after internment during World War II.

Because the wood can potentially be used to help tell the story of the local Japanese-American community experience, as well as the history of agriculture in the Pajaro Valley, the HRC has formed a subcommittee to see if the owner would be willing to allow timbers to be removed, and if there is an organization able and willing to help preserve them.

The Tut family has said the barn wood can be made available. We hope the Agricultural History Project will consider the task of moving and using the wood. Suzi Merriam and I are subcommittee members willing to assist coordination between interested parties.
