Background

- SB 620 Low-Impact Camping Areas (LICAs)
- Board directed local LICA ordinance
- Streamline permit process
- Expand camping opportunities
- Provide affordable access to outdoors
- Support rural landowners & farmers
- Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT)





Intersection with State Law

- Special Occupancy Parks Act (SOPA)
 - Regulates 2+ campsites
 - HCD permit to operate
 - Conditional Use Permit & noticed public hearing
- SB 620 Low-impact camping areas
 - Proposed state bill
 - Exempts LICA with 9 or fewer campsites
 - Expected approval this year

>>> LICA Ordinance Changes

- One campsite before SB 620 approved
- Nine campsites after SB 620 approved

Overview of Ordinance

New SCCC 13.10.695 - Low-Impact Camping Areas


- Max 14 days consecutive & < 28 days/year per camper
- One campsite max (or up to 9 campsites after SB 620 approved)

New permit process for LICA

- Ministerial permit, Zoning Clearance
- TOT registration


Operating and Development Standards

- Min 5 acre parcel in rural areas
- Within zone districts: A, CA, RA, TP, SU, PR or PF
- Density: 1 campsite/acre
- Do not displace agricultural activity
- Local property manager, available 24/7



Ordinance Provisions

- Clarify regulations > rentals, non-engineering plans, County Parks exempt
- Protect natural resources > avoid sensitive habitat, clustering, max density
- Public safety > avoid hazard areas, pet regulations, access road standards
- Neighborhood impacts > setbacks, property manager within 15 miles
- Code enforcement > permit renewal process, advertising, violations

- Continue the public hearing from the February 28, 2024, hearing, on the proposed Low-Impact Camping Area Ordinance; and
